Notes and Biography

Lyric for Strings

George Walker

George Walker, a piano major, chapel organist and tennis player at Oberlin College Conservatory of music, who hailed from Washing, D.C., graduated at the age of 18. He went to Philadelphia to pursue Artist Diplomas in piano performance and composition at the Curtis Institute. In 1946, at 24 years of age, Walker completed his first string quartet which was subsequently performed by a Curtis graduate quartet. While composing the second movement, Walker received a call from his father, a prominent physician, informing him that Walker's beloved maternal grandmother, Malvina King – a former slave who fled a Virginia plantation for freedom in D.C. during the Civil war – had passed away. Walker titled the second movement *Lament* and dedicated it to the memory of his grandmother. Later, after expanding the second movement from quartet to string orchestra as a stand-alone piece, he changed the title to *Lyric for Strings*, but kept the dedication.

Carmen-Suite

Georges Bizet – Rodion Shchedrin

In the late 1960's, the reigning prima ballerina of Moscow's great Bolshoi Ballet, Maya Plisetskaya, asked the director of the Cuban National Dance Company to create a vehicle for her based on Georges Bizet's great opera, Carmen. The search for a composer did not begin with Plisetskaya's husband, Rodion Shchedrin, but it did end with him. Perhaps Shostakovich, Khachaturian and other great Soviet composers were reluctant to fool with Bizet's music, or, for that matter, test the rather conservative Soviet art bureaucracy. At last, Shchedrin, took the challenge and Carmen-Suite was created. Of course, the bureaucracy condemned the music as disrespectful to the original, and the choreography as too erotic. Further performances of Carmen-Suite, including during an upcoming tour of the west, were cancelled, and the sets were put into storage. Then Shostakovich, himself a victim of sanction and condemnation during his career, but then head of the Soviet Composer's Union, expressed his support of the work. The work was revived and it remains a fairly regular part of the company's repertory.

Shchedrin's approach was to re-compose, re-order and re-orchestrate much Bizet's opera starting with the decision to write for an orchestra of strings only with a massive battery of percussion instruments. Two movements, #8 and # 10, do not originate with *Carmen*, but were composed by Bizet for different operas. Do you know their origins?

Dr. Mitchell Arnold is in his fourteenth year as WVU's Director of Orchestral Activities. In 2014, the orchestra was selected to perform at the College Orchestra Directors Association national conference in Fort Worth, Texas. The orchestra has also toured Maryland, Virginia, and recently began annual concerts at Carnegie Hall in Lewisburg, West Virginia. Dr. Arnold appeared as guest conductor of the United States Navy Band in Washington DC in 2018, a rare honor for a civilian musician. He has also guest-conducted the Omaha Symphony, Toledo Symphony, Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, West Virginia Symphony Orchestra and the Santa Fe Symphony Orchestra.
