Biographies

Linxi Yang is currently a doctoral student in collaborative piano at WVU studying with Dr. Lucy Mauro. Linxi, from the coastal city of Taizhou, Zhejiang province, earned her undergraduate and master's degrees from Shanghai Conservatory and also worked at the Zhejiang Art School. In 2014, Linxi also was awarded the Teacher Certification for Chinese Colleges and Universities. She has been invited to perform in Canada, America, France, Tunisia, Singapore, Thailand, Japan among other countries. Linxi's recent awards include the Canady and Sprouse scholarships at WVU, the Gold Award in the China-South Korea International Piano Competition (four-hand group), and the Excellent Collaborative Piano Award in the National Higher Art Colleges' "Peacock Cup" Competition. Linxi has published eight books for college students including Selected Chinese Vocal Music (volumes 1-7) and Selected Chinese and Foreign Ensemble Vocal Music for which she composed the piano arrangements. In recent years, she has published over 500 piano accompaniment scores in a variety of books and journals throughout Asia. In July 2021, she was invited by the Chinese government to perform two special concerts in China that reached an in-person and online audience of over 50,000 and were acclaimed by the national media.

Ethan Nylander, from Townsend, Delaware, is a Junior Flute Performance Major studying at West Virginia University with Nina Assimakopoulos. Some of Ethan's recent accolades include winning First Place in the 2020 Central Ohio Flute Association Collegiate Competition, First Place in the 2021 Great Composers: Rising Talents of the Americas, First Place in the 2022 Atlanta Flute Club Carl D. Hall Piccolo Competition, and Second Place in the 2022 Flute Society of Greater Philadelphia Young Artist Competition. In the summer of 2021, he was accepted into the National Symphony Orchestra Summer Music Institute where he won First Place in the solo competition. Ethan previously played in a pre-professional Flute Quartet, the Aether Quartet, which competed and won prizes in the WVU ChaMP Competition, the Kentucky Flute Association, and the Fischoff Chamber Music Competition. Ethan is also minoring in French at WVU, and after graduating, he hopes to further his studies in France. When he isn't playing the flute, Ethan enjoys swimming, going on hikes, reading, and trying authentic cuisine.

Nathaniel Penven is a senior music education major who hails from Blacksburg, Virginia. During his time at WVU, where he is a student of Dr. Jeffrey Siegfried, Nathaniel has had the privilege of performing with a myriad of ensembles, including the Wind Symphony, Symphonic Band, Quartet Appalachia, and the WVU Jazz Ensemble. More recently, Nathaniel has enlisted into the 249th West Virginia Army National Guard Band in Morgantown to begin what he hopes to be a prosperous military band career. Primarily a baritone saxophonist, Nathaniel is eager to show the world the range of capabilities of this often-misunderstood instrument, from technique at break-neck speed to delicate phrasing at the softest of volumes.

Dr. Mitchell Arnold is in his fifteenth year as WVU's Director of Orchestral Activities. In 2014, the orchestra was selected to perform at the College Orchestra Directors Association national conference in Fort Worth, Texas. The orchestra has also toured Maryland, Virginia, and recently began annual concerts at Carnegie Hall in Lewisburg, West Virginia. Dr. Arnold appeared as guest conductor of the United States Navy Band in Washington DC in 2018, a rare honor for a civilian musician. He has also guest-conducted the Omaha Symphony, Toledo Symphony, Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, West Virginia Symphony Orchestra and the Santa Fe Symphony Orchestra.
